memoir written by Gypsy Rose Lee and puts the focus on her mother Rose, who tries to raise her two daughters to get into show business.

Bob Stehman is handling directing duties for the Smash Productions edition.

"Villagers like to see things they're familiar with," Stehman said. "I told my neighbors about it, and they said, 'Oh, I want to see that.' Even if the audience may not know it, they know the songs."

Deborah Gibbons plays Mama Rose, someone who always wanted to perform on stage but never got the chance.

"She's living her life through her kids," said Gibbons, of the Village of Glenbrook. "She's just a powerhouse."

Gibbons said Mama Rose reminds her a bit of her own mother.

"She's critical but she's doing it out of love," Gibbons said.

Gibbons, husband, Garry, plays Herbie, who becomes the girls' agent and becomes a love interest for Mama Rose.

"He's a cool guy," Garry said. "The last two shows I've been in, I've been a bad guy."

Garry's first appearance in a musical came when he was in the seventh grade. He played a newsboy in "Gypsy."

"There are some great songs, some real tear-jerkers," Garry said.

Smash Productions brought in a couple of children to the cast: Aven Wood as Baby June and Sofia Sallee as Young Louise.

"Aven could be on Broadway," Stehman said.

It turns out that Wood

and Sallee are best friends and next-door neighbors. They were excited when they learned they were both cast.

Bringing the songs to life throughout the show is a live seven-piece band.

"We've got folks at the top of their game," said Stehman, of the Village of Bonita. "They have such strong talent."

"Every actor in this show gives 100%, no matter how small the role," Maloney said. "They know what they want, and they get it with professionalism."
